



From humble beginnings...

In 1985 in response to the devastating Ethiopian famine, Community Aid Abroad Australia (CAA) proposed funding and training for a domestic water supply program in the villages of Tigray, northern Ethiopia. CAA's local partner the **Relief Society of Tigray** (REST), founded in 1978, had until then been engaged in emergency food aid, health, education and some irrigation programs. CAA's offer was to assist with the development of a hand dug wells program, suited to the rough terrain and limited available local resources. By the early 1990s and working closely with CAA, REST had created a Water Department, trained scores of well technicians, employed skilled hydrogeologists and developed a supply line for necessary equipment. REST's expertise in water became well established, coming from humble beginnings during the great 1884/85 famine.

When CAA (by then, Oxfam Australia) withdrew funding to focus on other areas, WellWishers was established in 2007.

Water supply and associated food security programs have now become a central feature of REST's world-renowned work. It has become the largest Ethiopian non-government organisation (NGO), possibly the largest national NGO in Africa.

I believe it is not an overstatement to say that the humble hand dug wells program inaugurated in 1985 has led to the transformation of the lives of two million people through the provision of clean drinking water.

Talking of his experience with REST, and reflecting on the last four years alone, Heshe Lemma, the Deputy Director of REST, writes:

WATER IS LIFE!!! It has been clear to all of us that potable water is scarce in the rural and urban areas of Tigray (northern Ethiopia). To mitigate the scarcity, REST has given top priorities to create, develop and access clean and safe water both to the people and livestock at their near localities. In the last four years alone, REST has constructed deep wells, shallow wells, hand dug wells and spring development in total of 5600 water points functioning to benefit more than 200,000 households!

One of the (borehole) water points of 60 metres deep is located at Kola Tembien Werede, Bega Sheka Tabia. Asqual Assefa, 35, a mother of 3 children, said that previously she was obliged to walk 3 to 4 hours every other day to fetch unsafe drinking water and very limited in quantity. "Now, thanks to REST I only spent 15 minutes to fetch clean and safe water which is well controlled by REST and our committee".

In addition to our Hand Dug Wells program, and using funds from Charity Water in the US, REST has purchased a number of borehole drilling machines which are able to seek water at much deeper levels.

However, our Hand Dug Wells program remains a vital element in water supply in remote areas where REST's large machinery is unable to go, or boreholes are unsuitable.

WellWishers can be proud of the critical role our support has played and continues to play in working to ensure the supply of safe drinking water for over four million rural Ethiopians in Tigray Region.

REST's capacity in Water has developed exponentially since 1985. From the (seemingly) simple and low tech hand dug wells, to spring capping, to borehole drilling with sophisticated heavy machinery and the use of solar pumps to reticulate borehole water large distances, REST has become a leader in village water supply in Ethiopia. Clean nearby water supplies have improved rural health and educational opportunities, especially for girls.

REST's work in hillside terracing for water and soil conservation, check dams and irrigation systems has led to increased food supplies.

WellWishers has played a vital role in this development and reinforced the close friendship between the Australian and Ethiopian communities.
