Our Future = Tigrayans Future



As long as **WellWishers** stays strong and keeps a healthy donation base, we'll continue to see improvements in the health and welfare of rural Tigayans. Ross and I have visited many homes, seen ongoing change and are constantly amazed at the quick uptake of new ideas and programmes. The overwhelming factor in this, is the easier access to a supply of clean water.

Visiting on an annual basis is good, giving Tigrayans hope, real hope. It gives them a small insight into our world and helps them know they are not a forgotten people, that others in this big world know and care.

The local and district governing bodies have much improved and are now better able to cope with demands. But as is often the case in countries devasted by years of internal conflict & continuous drought, it's a long, slow process to change years of neglect and opportunity.

WellWishers are not alone in helping Tigrayans. Whenever the opportunity arises, the people will help themselves & each other. Rural villagers see education as being the main focus of life improvement. This includes education about day to day working activities, land usage, land preservation, health and hygiene, basic schooling and family planning. They actively take up new ideas and methods.

Ross in his talks, tells of the community who was unable to attract school teachers as they had no access to clean water. A

well was built and the community decided to continue their building contribution by constructing 2 classroom blocks nearby (pictured at right). As soon as the buildings were complete and they had enough roofing iron for 1 classroom block [the only thing supplied by government], they opened the school. No seating, no finished flooring but the building was there, the water was there and now they have teachers.

That community entertained us with a play written on the affect clean water has on families and communities. It was a most entertaining 15 minutes with adults, children and teachers all contributing.

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Health & Sanitation - Ross' Observations from October 2009 Visit

As mentioned in the last Newsletter, I was very impressed with the advances made in health issues since 2008. I'd like to share some of them with you here:



- Most children now take water to school to drink whilst walking long distances and for washing & gardening activities
- Throughout Ethiopia, one Health Extension Worker [HEW like a Nursing Assistant] and 20 voluntary assistants, cover 5 village. Between them, each household is visited at least weekly to discuss health and hygiene issues.
- The HEWs carry a backpack [supplied by the UN] filled with medication and 3 methods of birth control the take-up of which [with great support from the husbands] is quite high. Contraception is provided free by the Government.
- •REST [our partner] and the HEWs train 10 households per village on health, hygiene, HIV & AIDS and family planning matters. These households in turn, pass on their knowledge to the other families thus covering all of the village. 60% of households have been trained up to September 09, with a target of 100% by the end of this year. An amazing effort in a country of 80 million.
- In most villages visited, up to 70% now have latrines [mainly with flues, with water containers for washing nearby], versus none before they received our hand dug well. This was achieved in one year.
- Generally throughout Ethiopia, 80% of all diseases are attributed to lack of clean water.





• Two sad stories came from 1 village. The first was of a mother with 4 young children. Whilst collecting water from the usual source, she slipped down the steep bank. Later that day, when she had not returned, the neighbours searched for her and found she had drowned. At that time, the father was fighting in the Ethiopian/Eritrean border war and was sadly killed. The 4 young children effectively became wards of the kushet (village). The other story was of a man (pictured at left) who lost his son in the same way.

Other notes of interest:



- A few houses now use weak, battery powered lights by which children do homework, thus extending their day. We're concerned about potential eye damage and have taken this up with REST.
- Quite a few houses now have enclosed stoves with external flues, halving timber usage [hence also halving collecting times] and reducing respiratory problems. Increased use of dry cattle dung also reduces timber usage.
- A majority of homes have replaced their leaking thatched roofs with paper-thin corrugated iron roofs, thus keeping the rain out [when it rains!].
- Tigray's wet season this year was 50% of normal, so the locals are bracing themselves for more hard times.
