WellWishers Achievements



Last Newsletter, we mentioned that we will be funding 115 new wells this year. We should have advised that this will take the number since 2002, to about 310. This means over 140,000 people will have received the benefits of clean water

Future Programme

Our Ethiopian implementation partner REST [Relief Society for Tigray] has advised that the number of wells supporting big village populations, is rapidly reducing. This is good news. Resulting from this, are new guidelines for future wells. 350 average [reducing to 300 in 2012] populations with minimum, average walking time [excluding waiting] of 1 and a half hours.

But there is still a long way to go. Barely 50% of Tigray's rural population currently has access to clean water.

Janice & Andrew's Impressions on Integrated Programmes, October 2010

Tigray was quite a surprise, not in famine or overgrazed, as we'd imagined. Following the wet season, the irregularly shaped fields of lush crops of various shades were being harvested with small hand scythes & threshed using oxen. We were happily received by people with an open confidence for positive future outcomes. Two projects particularly impressed us:

- 1. Beekeeping project: Previously barren hillsides had been terraced with stone walls and livestock had been withdrawn, allowing impressive regeneration with a great variety and numbers of indigenous, nectar-producing plant species. Landless young people were given modern bee boxes and microcredit to buy a colony of bees to forage these terraces, resulting in top quality honey and a sustainable and income producing industry.
- 2. Water management: Walking the fertile plain at the base of rocky hills, accompanied by the confident and competent local head man, provided examples of REST's planning. Tamped down earth walls were built across 'wild' water eroded gullies. These walls slow, hold and re-direct the silt laden water during the short rainy season, which flows off the hills, giving the water time to soak into the ground and replenish the water table. There were also deep ditches and holes, having a small surface area to minimise evaporation, sometimes using a mechanical pump to distribute water to channels as necessary. On the reclaimed land, we marvelled at the variety of healthy vegetables, fruit trees and crops.

REST's planning and implementation of their projects and the calibre of their staff, all locals on local salaries, impressed us.



Visit to a Tigray Village

As supporters of *Wellwishers* Toni and I were grateful for the opportunity to tour Ethiopia with Ross and Marianne and some fellow supporters, in October last year. The experience is one we will not soon forget.

Ethiopia is a remarkable country. Its history is one of struggle and more struggle, yet there is a sense of optimism for the future and an industriousness that perhaps, with our comparative wealth and ease of lifestyle, we have lost.

Certainly for us the highlight of our tour was a visit to the village where the well we sponsored is now in use. The countryside is mountainous and the difficulty previously endured by the women and girls in carrying water was immediately obvious. The welcome given to our group was quite remarkable, with singing and dancing and lots of smiling faces; but to sing & dance and feel our common humanity only emphasised to me the yawning gap in opportunity and circumstance that exists between our two cultures. That Toni and I, with no real impact on our own circumstances, could have such a profound effect on the lives of 400 to 500 people is both humbling and sad. Certainly, our resolve to continue our support for *Wellwishers* has been strengthened.

FRIENDS ON THE ROAD



As a WellWishers traveller in Ethiopia, you are never without friends – either fleetingly or forever.

Friends are made quickly. There are the friends you make in the streets, visiting special places or as an instant wedding guest in the Ghion Gardens in Addis when couples and their families flock there for their photographs at weekends.

Outside Addis, villagers wave in greeting as they travel to market. Sometimes, children run alongside your vehicle with exuberant smiles, arms flailing and thumbs up. People are eager to share their stories. Village women tell of demanding daily routines; proudly, a student shows me his one roomed home; a boy in Axum insists my friend and I visit his Mum living opposite.

Progress in the big cities and smaller towns sits alongside almost biblical rural scenes – farmers threshing wheat by hand scythe for example - in landscapes dotted with *tukuls* like stars in the sky.

The deepest sense of history, the upkeep of culture accompanied by an importance of family, underpin people's daily lives. Somehow, the Ethiopian people hold an unspoken knowing about how to be in the world. These are our friends on the road.
