Amete is a 9 year old Tigrayan girl who 2 years ago, lived in a rural village typical of the ones for which WellWishers fund wells. Since settling in Australia, she has learnt English, with a great Aussie accent, and loves going to school. She and her younger sister Frewoini recently busked at a local market and earned \$21.20 for WellWishers!



This is her story in her own, unedited words.

#### **School in Tigray**

Children and adults in Tigray go to school for the same reason in Australia – they want to learn to read and write. If they can read and write they can have jobs to do. If they can add up they can sell the things they grow or make themselves.

Hi, I am Amete-B'rhan who is writing this letter to you. I went to school in Tigray for two years and I thought you might like to know about it.

School in Tigray was difficult. They didn't have chairs and desks like in Australia. They didn't have many books or pens. Seats are made of dirt and rocks and every morning the children have to spread water on the dirt floor. Each day your lap was your desk.

In each class there are children and adults doing the same kind of work. Everybody just wants to make their life better for themselves and their families.

School was only for half a day, because children and adults had to work at their own property. They need to get water every morning, look after their goats, sheep, cows, horses, donkeys and children and baby brothers or sisters while their parents are working hard too.

I used to go to school in the afternoon with my aunty and friends. Before school I would get up, have about a tablespoon full of left over dinner for breakfast and walk with my neighbour down the rocky hill, fill a big plastic container with water, walk back up to our house, and put it into other containers. Then get the goats out, take a rope and tie it around my hip and collect firewood while keeping an eye on the goats.

There was no electricity or watches where I lived in Tigray. From the top of the hill where I was watching the goats I would hear children leaving the morning school and then I would know it was time for the afternoon children to make their way down the hill to go to school. I would then call to my sister Frewoini, that I was at this spot so that she would know to get my home made school bag and come back after having some thing very little to eat and we would swap – that means that Frewoini looks after the goats and I go to school.

It was about a three kilometre walk to school. Some people might think that it was a long way, but we had fun walking and I was used to it. We would sing and run and I looked forward to seeing my friends, just like I do in Australia.

Tigrinyans think that education is important, that is why they go to school instead of working all day.

**Impact Assessment Report** 

As reported in earlier Newsletters, last October we received a 103 page report on selected wells funded by WellWishers, covering the methodology of the programme and the impact it has had on those communities fortunate to have received a well. At WellWisher's expense, this report was prepared by Professional Consulting & Business PLC, an independent consultant from Ethiopia. As part of our transparency & accountability obligations to our supporters, we will repeat this exercise probably every 3 years to ensure our goals are being met.

The Consultant made 16 recommendations on how to improve the delivery process, 15 of which will be incorporated into future Agreements with REST, our Ethiopian project-implementing partner.

Broadly speaking, the report confirmed the achievement of expected health, education & gender benefits. Some minor matters of training need addressing and we have taken these up with REST. We shall continue our annual monitoring process to ensure these problems do not recur. Most of the implementation problems relate to government bodies rather than REST. I should emphasis we have had nothing but a positive reaction from those authorities who have demonstrated eagerness in solving these issues.
