### **Annual General Meeting**

Ross Allan was re-elected for another 4 year term at the AGM in Melbourne on 5 November 2012. The audited accounts were also approved. In broad terms, the audited figures for Financial Year 2011/12 are:-

> Surplus carried over from FY11/12 8,885 Revenue [donations, dinner etc] 383,122 Expenditure [dinner/Newsletter costs 7,487 etc] Funds transferred to NCCA [182,125]

Retained Funds as at 30 June 2012

The Retained Funds will go to the 2013 wells programme whilst the funds held by NCCA pays for the 2012 and part of the 2013 programmes. We're pleased to be able to tell you that for this past Financial Year, the cost of running WellWishers was reduced to 1.95% of revenue received. Therefore, 98.05% of Financial Year 2011/12 income goes to **Ethiopia**. Hooray for volunteers.

### 'OUR DREAM WAS SOLVED'

says Kahsa Gebre-tsadkan from Ma'agel



"I used to fetch water from deep gorges, that was not easily accessible even when not carrying jerrycans full of water" says 27 year old Kahsa Gebretsadkan, mother of two boys.

Kahsa recalls the ups and downs she had experienced to fetch dirty water. She was mainly worried about water borne diseases such as Amoeba which had infected a number of people in the village.

Before the well was built in her hamlet, Kahsa, like other girls and women of Ma'agel village, had to walk about two hours a trip. When she arrived at the river, she faced another task - the long, waiting queue. She had to spend more time until it was her turn to fetch water. Being reminded of all those troubles, Kasha said "We were at high risk. A risk related to water. The water we were drink was highly contaminated. People washed their bodies and clothes over it. Animals such as cattle, donkeys, goats and sheep were equally sharing with us. It had bad smell and bad taste. There were small worms."

"After construction of the new well," said Kahsa "we have clean drinking water besides our home. If you observe it, the water is pure and well protected. It is fenced, so no animals can touched it as in the river. Any kind of contamination is now already avoided. Second, it decreases the distance we had accustomed for many years. Today, especially to me, it is a matter of less than five minutes to fetch and come back home and no queuing. Finally we had enough amount of quality water. Our dream was solved."

"Water is key for all." Gidena Gebre-tatyos [now 25 years old] was born and bred in Moztey village.



Her village has been hit by critical water shortages over the past years. She used to spend nearly 3 hours a round trip to collect one jerrycan a day. If she goes in the evening, she must wait by the river until dark as there are many people queuing to fetch water before her. She said that there was a time she had to wait until 8:00 pm to fetch water from the river. "We had lack of clean water. No hygiene and sanitation. The water was mixed with animal dung that was polluting the water. But we did not have an alternative rather than to drink it" she added.

In 2010, the village received a water well with the financial aid of WellWishers. About this new well, Gidena says "It is at about 100 metre distance from my home. It takes only two minutes. This left me with great satisfaction. Even



for a while, I did not expect to have clean underground water from this field. Thanks for our helpers, they show us the path of change since water is key for all."
